
Important Reminders:

Mosquito Control

Because we are in mosquito season, and the emergence of mosquito borne illness, such as West Nile Virus, Chikugunya, and Zika Virus may be present, the city

recently completed one of two applications of mosquito spraying throughout the city. Mosquito spraying was completed on June 30th and a second application will occur on July 28th at a cost of \$2,983.00. Please keep children and pets indoors during the evening hours while spraying occurs. The City of Niles and Trumbull County Combined Health District have teamed up to reduce the mosquito population in the community and protect residents from mosquito bites. As such, the



TCCHD will be providing, at no cost to the residents, a mosquito larvaciding service, which are tablets dropped into stagnant water to inhibit mosquito breeding. Please contact the Mayor's office for mosquito tablets.

Updates from the Safety Departments

Niles Police- Chief Jaison Holland

Please be mindful when driving on city roadways of children playing outside, bicyclists, and pedestrians walking/jogging this summer. Please adhere to city speed limits.

The Niles Police Department received a provisional certification for the latest standards set by the Ohio Collaborative Community/Police Advisory Board. This year's topic was the department's vehicle pursuit policy, which was reviewed by the board and found to be compliant with their standards. The Ohio Collaborative Community/Police Advisory Board certification is a voluntary process in which a law enforcement agency submits their policies and procedures for review by a state appointed board of assessors who establish best practices. The department is now certified by the collaborative in the below areas of: Use of Force, Recruitment and Hiring, Community Engagement, Body Worn Cameras, Dispatcher Training, Bias Free Policing, Investigation of Employee Misconduct, and Vehicle Pursuits.

Fire hydrant flushing has been completed. All hydrants have been flushed and tested by the Niles fire department.

Updates from the Service Departments

The 2020 Street resurfacing program will commence in September. Streets to be resurfaced will consist of the following:

Bonnie Brea (Niles Vienna to Spruce Ct.), Steel Street (West Federal to Main St.), West Federal (Main St. to Steel St.), Neil Street (North Main St. to Holford), Smith Street (Hunter to Hyde), Harry Stevens Alley (Robbins to East Park), Camrose (North Rd. to Trumbull), Moreland (SR 46 to Difford), Hartzell (Robbins to Niles Vienna), Hughes (SR 46 to Lafayette), and Lafayette (Pearl to Davis).

West Park and East State Street will be resurfaced through state/federal grant programs this Fall.

- cracked, broken, or unsafe sidewalks on your property
- vegetation maintenance of storm ditches/swales on private property
- service line replacement for gas, water, and sanitary

Quarterly Financial Report

As we continue to monitor our general fund, we ended the half way point of the fiscal year with a positive fund balance of \$9,293,826.27, with an encumbrance of \$322,443.89. The general fund pays for our safety forces, parks, cemetery, building, housing, zoning, and streets. All enterprise accounts remain positive, including electric, water, and sewer.

City wide overtime for the first half of the year came in at \$200,899.87, which is within budget. This number reflects emergency services for snow and ice removal, water break repairs, sewer backups, power outages, and police/fire overtime.

The Auditor and Treasurers offices are working very close with R.I.T.A to monitor income tax collections and evaluating how the COVID-19 situation will affect general fund revenues. The City continues to make cost-saving adjustments to the overall budget in an effort to make sure that our finances remain solvent due to income tax loss or delay. The City will have a better understanding of actual dollars lost due to the COVID-19 situation toward mid-August.

Be Stormwater Smart! Keep grass clippings out of the street

Grass clippings and bits of leaves that are blown into the street after lawn maintenance can be just as bad as other forms of litter. They clog up gutters and storm drains and what doesn't get stuck ends up in the nearest waterway (stream, pond, lake, and/or river) causing further problems. Any material (litter, grass clippings, leaves, etc.) in the storm drains reduces the amount of stormwater that can move through the drain system. Stormwater that should move quickly through the system may begin to back up, causing high water on roads or other, more hazardous, flooding situations.

Remember – there is no treatment or filtering of stormwater between the drain on your street to the nearest body of water. Even though grass clippings, leaves and soil are natural forms of debris, when they are put into the storm drain, they can destroy the balance of our waterways. Storm drains are not garbage disposals!

TIRE DROP-OFF:

Recycling

Annual tire drop-off will take Recycle stations are located behind the Safety-Service Complex. Please recycle responsibly and be sure all recyclables are placed in the bins and not in areas outside of the recycle bins.
